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

What’s SUP at Paddleboard Specialists this spring?

Stand up paddleboarding (SUP) is a sport gaining in popularity. It’s a way to be out on the water, take in the scenery and get some exercise in the process. The Northside of Madison is a perfect location for the sport, not only because of the proximity to Cherokee Marsh but also because it is home to the largest retail stores and distributors of paddleboards in the United States — Paddleboard Specialists is located just down the road in Westport.

The seven employees at Paddleboard Specialists are experts in the sport. They teach lessons and offer clinics for those interested in learning SUP. The staff is committed to

helping customers find the appropriate gear to enjoy the peaceful nature of the sport. This is their 30th year in the watersports business.

Owner Gary Stone explained, “Paddleboarding in its simplest form is using an oversize surf-type board and a long paddle. Users stand on the board and propel themselves forward with a paddle. People are often concerned they won’t have the balance to do the sport, but standing on the board is really easy. SUP has become incredibly popular because it is a great family activity, being on the water is very peaceful, and it can also be an amazing core workout if you paddle hard.”

Your Northside Planning Council (NPC) responds to our community's needs through the creation and implementation of a wide variety of programs and projects:

How do we manage to pay for it all?

The NPC has been very fortunate to have the ongoing support of the City of Madison through a biannual grant for operations expenses. The reality of our programs and operations, though, is that this grant accounts for just under 20 percent of our annual budget. We make up another 30

percent of our budget in advertising revenue through the Northside News, and 25 percent comes from FEED Kitchens user rental fees.

What about the remaining 25 percent?

That's where you come in. In order to keep the lights on, the Internet connected, paper in the copier and postage in the meter, we rely, not on the kindness of strangers, but on the support of our friends and neighbors. Some of that support comes through grants or underwriting of regular expenses, as our good friends at MGE do by paying for the printing of the calendar insert you find in each issue of the Northside News. But much of our funding comes from individuals who recognize the value that the NPC brings to the Northside, whether in our work to promote the area to new businesses, our ongoing relationships and communication with city and county staff, our convening of community events to help you connect with each other and learn more about the issues that impact us all, or our facilitation of new projects like this year's Northside Independence Day celebration.


The supper is a free meal of simple comfort food, an open gym for kids of all ages, and an opportunity to meet other Northsiders in a relaxed atmosphere.

While I can accomplish very little as an individual School Board member,

I hope that, working effectively with my School Board colleagues, we're able together to achieve the following goals.

My first goal is that, during my next three-year term, the school district remains focused and achieves measurable progress on the five priority areas identified in our Strategic Framework: providing every student with a rigorous, well-rounded, coherent and culturally responsive curriculum keyed to the Common Core State Standards; engaging our students in charting personalized pathways toward achieving their goals; effectively enlisting parents and community members as partners in their students' learning; cultivating a work environment that attracts, develops and retains a top-notch and diverse workforce of principals, teachers and staff; and ensuring accountability at all levels of the school district organization.

My second goal is that during this time of diminished state support to education, we find the resources to fund adequately our learning, technology and facilities needs while paying our teachers and staff something close to what they are worth, while remaining as restrained as possible in the extent to which we must increase our property taxes.

If I were allowed a third goal, it would be that a current member of the Madison School Board be elected governor at some point during my next term.

The first concrete measurable goal I would like to accomplish is

reducing the great disparity in terms of rates of suspensions for African American students within the district. During the last academic school year, African American students were suspended at a rate of nearly 24 percent. This compares to 6 percent for the next highest group. In order for us to begin to close an achievement gap that has existed for far too long in our district, we must substantially reduce these suspensions. Once we begin to see a reduction in suspension rates, I believe we will begin to see reductions in high rates of absenteeism and truancy as well as referrals for expulsions.

The second measurable goal I would like to accomplish is improving the dismal rate of graduation rates of African American and Latino students. During the last academic school year, the rates were an embarrassing 53 percent and 62 percent respectively. I believe that if we substantially decrease the kind of exclusionary discipline practice that leads to out of school suspensions that we will see a rise in the rate of graduation. This includes a host of strategies from expanding restorative justice practices to providing teachers with increased skills to manage the type of disruptive classroom behavior that can result in out of school suspensions. In school suspensions are far more preferable.

Two concrete and measurable goals that I will pursue if elected to the

school board are increasing the hiring and retention of staff of color by 2 percent each year, and providing enriching opportunities to 10 percent more students each year. We continue to see gaps in achievement and behavior data for students of color, special education students and students living in poverty. We struggle with an overrepresentation of students of color in special education and behavior referrals, while these same groups are underrepresented in TAG identification and advanced programming.

Both goals connect to closing the achievement gap. Art, music, outdoor education and athletics help develop all areas of a student's life. As we build excitement about the opportunities in our schools, our students will be engaged and our schools will be more competitive. Community support and partnerships are instrumental to ensuring that our students have the resources and support necessary to succeed. Greater diversity in our staff will help to ensure a welcoming environment that honors all families. Diversity is a great asset, because it exposes students to a variety of perspectives in the classroom, increases creativity and prepares them to compete globally. As a school board member, I will bring together all groups to ensure that our school district is competitive and that all students experience success in our schools.

Constructing a building requires more than designs, material and labor. It requires patience, and that's just what Independent Living, Inc. has been demonstrating in abundance.

The local nonprofit group plans to build a senior living community on Tennyson Lane. Late in 2013, the city's Urban Design Committee (UDC), Plan Commission and Common Council all gave approval for the General Design Plan for the site. Now the process is being repeated, this time with more refined plans.

Rita Giovannoni, CEO at Independent Living, Inc., said the refined designs have more definition about the use of interior space. "While we don't have pictures yet of what the various interior spaces will look like, we do know how everything will fit in the space we have to work with: the apartments, the commercial kitchen, the bakery/café, our community spaces, our health/fitness center and so forth," she said. In addition to independent senior apartments, the new housing community will offer assisted living and memory care. The assisted

The Rifken Group poised to develop Corben Business Campus near airport

As the economy improves, the buzz surrounding the property at the Dane County Airport entrance at Packers Avenue, International Lane and Anderson Street is increasingly optimistic about what might locate there. As the first and last view of Madison by business, political and tourism visitors traveling through the airport, development of this property is important to the perception of the Northside, City of Madison and surrounding region.

Development on the north edge of the property calls for a series of users such as a small hotel, restaurant, convenience store, bank and a variety of service retailers to serve the surrounding area. The 18-acre mixed-use commercial park, known as Corben Business Campus (CBC), extends along Packers Avenue. "The expansive views of the park-like setting of the neighboring Bridges Golf Course with the visibility from 40,000 pass-

ing cars, accessibility to major highways serving the city as well as being on the bus and bike path system, make locating a business on the campus very appealing," said developer Marty Rifken, of The Rifken Group (TRG). The city plan to extend Pankratzt Street southward to connect to Shopko Drive and Aberg Avenue/Hwy 30 stoplights will provide direct access to East Washington Avenue, Hwy. 151, Hwy. 51, Hwy. 30 and the Interstate system.

The CBC is suited for a variety of purposes including retail, office and light manufacturing. "A 4.8-acre and a seven-acre parcel on the business campus provide opportunity for construction of buildings as small as 10,000 square feet and as large as 100,000 square feet," said Rifken. Multiple forms of ownership that include lease, joint venture and full ownership are available. The design is a campus style approach where tenants share onsite amenities.

Marty Rifken, founder and owner of TRG, is a member of the Northside Business Association and Northside Economic Development Coalition. In business for more than 45 years, he's been involved with leasing, brokerage, management, renovation and new development projects throughout the city of Madison. In addition to typical brokerage and development activities, Rifken provides consulting services to clients who need to formulate a plan for adaptive re-use of their investment real estate or plan new development for vacant land. His involvement in the renovation and new construction process is total: from feasibility analysis and market research, to representation before city review panels, to collaboration on architectural plans and construction, to financing and leasing services to the seller, buyer, tenant and landlord.
